

HE LATE ACTOR Sir Laurence Olivier once said, "I believe that in a great city, or even a small city or a

village, a great theater is the outward and visible sign of an inward and probable culture." If that statement is correct, then the Oregon Coast is a bastion of flourishing communities, based on the number of theaters that inhabit the many towns and cities along the coastline. The coast is home to more than a dozen playhouses, thanks in part to the volunteers, contributors, and theater-goers that support them.

Broadway producers, musicals, original plays, and classic tales all make their way to the coast. Some annual productions,

like North Bend's Little Theater on the Bay's *Little Ole Opry* and *Country Christmas*, celebrate the season with music, dance, and comedy while others like Astor Street Opry Company's *Shanghaied in Astoria*, portray Oregon Coast history.


"Theater allows us to see ourselves in each other. Telling stories allows us to remember who we are," says Nancy Montgomery from Astoria's River Theater. "Theater isn't something that's separate from reality. On the contrary, it mirrors reality back to us so we can rage, laugh, cry, identify with ourselves, with each other."

Theater is the expression of these individual communities, and they offer it with true artistic style that is pure entertainment.

On Broadway Thespians

The On Broadway Thespians recently moved from the On Broadway Theater into their new digs—the historic Egyptian Theatre and Gussies Dinner Theater.

Dramas, comedy, musicals, and children's theater are all fair game for the Thespians, and they perform with extraordinary professionalism. They plan on offering seven shows this year.

The classic Egyptian Revival style of the 83-year-old Egyptian Theatre is reason alone to see a play there. Eight-foot tall pharaohs stand guard at the stairways, wrought-iron ceiling lights in the form of hooded cobras stand ready to strike, and columns at the stage contain hieroglyphic writing.

"We were told that the last performance of a live play at the Egyptian was over 80 years ago, and we had the unique fortune to be able to use the painted drops for our background for three of our four shows," says Leatha Lewison Gonzalez, president of On Broadway Thespians. We are a small non-profit community theater with actors and directors made up from our small local community, so our resources are rather small and humbling. Sorry we could not be of more help to you at this time.")

from Dallas of Winniepeg, Canada:

"I have to wear a mask in an upcoming school play, and it's so hot and uncomfortable, I really don't know if I can do it. So I was wondering if you had any tips or advice?"

(Editor responds: "There's a certain amount of discomfort you just can't get around. Masks should be lightweight with flexible so they can move a bit with your face. They should also have padding cut to fit the mask inside. If the mask is impeding your speech, try putting a bit of foam padding on the cheeks to push it away from your face. If you're having trouble blinking or it's pressing down on you, add 1 /4 inch of foam padding and glue it into the mask to lift it off your face. Don't forget to apply a bit of anti-perspirant to the face if sweating becomes an issue. Padded masks help with sweat absorption. Other than that, you'll just have to grin and bear it. Good luck!")

TYA/USA



A culture war is being waged in American theatre today: New play developments vs. the old Classic standbys.

"New unproven plays are considered risky," says Polly Carl, producing artistic director of Minneapolis's The Playwrights' Center, "and getting Theatres to dive into that risk with new experimental material as opposed to the old familiar Classics in which audiences are already comfortable with and have already developed a

taste for, is the greatest challenge currently facing the American theatre."

According to Stage-Directions.com, an popular on-line theatre magazine, royal-ties can eat up quite a bit of your budget. Disney production royalties are incredibly high. Beauty and the Beast for example, takes 15 percent of gross receipts and that is huge when compared to other older plays, like Inherit the Wind at 8 percent or royalty-free works like Shakespeare, Shaw and Wilde.

"We try to offer our audience a full range," says Ethan Mc-Sweeny of Chautauqua Theater Company. "We try to do one classic American play, a 20th century classic, and also something more contemporary, which usually ends up being a comedy. We're aware that we often bring in an audience not accustomed to going to the theatre, and so the hope is that after the show we send them back out wanting to come back."



New Works of Merit Playwriting Contest 2008

New Works of Merit Playwriting Contest is looking for powerful, heart-felt new works that not only entertain, but also educate, enlighten and uplift humanity in the following ways:

- 1) Enhances self-realization
- 2) Supports peace and social justice
- 3) Fosters understanding of minority issues that focus on racial, ethnic, gender discrimination in the USA and abroad
- 4) Empowers youth to build healthy inner foundations
- 5) Educates to gain further insight into healthy social/emotional living
- 6) Sheds new light on religious, spiritual, and cultural differences and issues
- 7) Builds respect for cultural expression and identity in a world that is experiencing rapid globalization
- 8) Explores widening gap between values this country was founded on and values we present to the world today

AWARDS: 1st Place is \$300 and a public reading. 2nd and 3rd Place Awards will be readings. In addition, special Certificates of Honorable Mentions will be given for noteworthy scripts of merit. All readings will be presented at theatre venues in Manhattan, among them Thirteenth Street Repertory Theatre, within 10 months of the contest's winning announcement. Venue, directors and actors for the readings will be chosen at our discretion.

SCRIPT EVALUATORS: to include published and produced writers, theatrical producers, artistic directors, individuals in the Graduate and Masters Theatre Programs of universities including New York University, the New School University, and Vassar. Each script will receive up to four evaluations before 3 - 5 finalists are selected. Director of Literary Services and Founder of the New Works of Merit Playwriting Contest, Sandra Nordgren will oversee all script evaluations. Since January 2002, Nordgren has been responsible for the offering of over 150 readings, 35 productions, 16 development workshops, and two theater playwriting residencies, all in New York City at no cost to the playwright.

Submission post-mark deadline is June 30, 2008. Target date to announce winners is December 31, 2008. Winners will be notified by mail. Contest results will be posted on the above website.


<u>ELIGIBLE SCRIPTS</u>: Original full-length (no longer than 2 hours or 100 pages U.S. Standard Format) and one-act stage plays including children's plays. Please note: scripts having received a workshop, staged reading, or non-professional production are also eligible. Plays submitted must be the original work of the author and meet mission statement criteria.

<u>INELIGIBLE SCRIPTS:</u> Musicals, published scripts, scripts that have received a professional production, adaptations, collections and scripts that do not meet mission statement criteria.

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

- 1) Application form: http://hometown.aol.com/sandranord/myhomepage/travel.html
- 2) Prefer U.S. Standard Format, though this format is not required.
- 3) Script should be securely bound (no clips).
- 4) Full contact information on the cover/title page.
- 5) Brief synopsis of the play, no longer than half a page, bound into script. **
- 6) Brief character descriptions, bound into script. **
- 7) Script pages must be numbered.
- If the play has accompanying film sequences, please submit a video or DVD of them.
- 9) To verify script receipt, submit a SASP. Please write the name of the play on the postcard. We will return this postcard to you with the play's Roster Intake #.
- 10) If you want the play returned, submit a SASE. The play, with it's jacket, must fit into the envelope. Otherwise we will not be able to return it. Scripts will be returned or discarded when the evaluation process for the script is over.
- 11) Include a small SASE for script evaluations.
- 12) Send a CERTIFIED CHECK OR MONEY ORDER (payable to **New Works of Merit Playwriting Contest**) for \$25.00 submission fee. Fees will be used to pay stipends to play evaluators and administrative personnel.

**Be sure to include a bound synopsis & character description. Any paperwork NOT bound into the script will be filed with the Application form and will not be considered in the evaluation process. You may staple them to the back of the cover page if you do not have another way to fasten them.

Generally seek enthusiastic people who look and feel comfortable on stage, listen well and follow directions easily, and are open-minded enough to try new & different roles than originally intended auditioning for. If you sing or can play an instrument, let your talent be known! We're always looking for House musicians & singers for our musicals!
